Purpose: To provide the Health Occupations Education student with an opportunity to develop and demonstrate knowledge and skills as a Surgical Technologist.

Description The competitive event will consist of a written evaluation of knowledge and of Event: performance of selected skill procedure(s) identified in a written scenario. The scenario will require the use of critical thinking skills. The performance will be timed and evaluated according to the event guidelines.

- **Dress Code:** Competitors shall wear professional attire appropriate to the occupational area during the written exam and skill procedure(s). School identification or name pins must be removed or covered during competition.
- **Rules and** 1. Competitors in this event must be or have been enrolled in a state-approved **Procedures** Health Occupations Education program at the appropriate level (postsecondary/collegiate) in which the competencies outlined in this event are taught. Competitors should compete in skill events at the highest level of their training.
- 2. The selection of specific procedures and the development of the written exam shall be the responsibility of the National HOSA Competitive Events Program. The written exam will consist of fifty (50) multiple choice items. Competitors will be given one hour to complete the exam. Automatic scoring will be used.
- 3. Each competitor will be evaluated on his/her performance on a written exam and selected procedure(s). The procedures approved for this event are:

Procedure I: Written Exam - Test Plan (Required)

Procedure II: Scrubbing

A. Preliminary

B. Major

Procedure III: Drying Hands Procedure IV: Gowning (self)

Procedure V: Closed Gloving (self)
Procedure VI: Drape Backtable - Mayo Stand

Procedure VII: Basic setup, including basic instruments. Establish an organized, functional sterile field for a specified surgical procedure; i.e., femoral hernia, appendectomy, mastectomy (State), inguinal hernia, laparotomy, breast biopsy, mastectomy (National)

Procedure VIII: Gowning and Gloving Another Person

Procedure IX: Remove Gown and Gloves (self)

Procedure X: Identify Surgical Instruments

- A. Identify 25 instruments by name
- B. List instruments in correct category
- C. Spell names of instruments correctly
- D. Identify an acceptable surgical procedure use

National Level: advanced level demonstration includes entry level skills plus surgical specialty instruments and procedures.

- 4. All official references are used in the development of the written test. The specific reference selected for each procedure is listed in the Facilities, Equipment and Materials section of these guidelines.
- Atkinson, Lucy Jo. Berry & Kohn's Operating Room Technique, latest edition. Mosby.
- · Meeker and Rothrock. <u>Alexander's Care of the Patient in Surgery</u>, latest edition. Mosby.
- Wells, M.P. <u>Surgical Instruments: A Pocket Guide</u>, latest edition.
- 5. The selected procedure(s), in the form of a written scenario, will be presented to competitors two-three minutes prior to the actual skill(s) presentation. The scenario will be the same for each competitor and will include a challenging component that will require the competitor to apply critical thinking skills.
 - 6. This event will NOT be open to observers.
- 7. Should a tie occur in the ranking of competitors, the selected procedure with the highest possible point value will be used as the tie breaker; others as necessary in descending order of total point value.
- 8. If a competitor jeopardizes the patient's or his/her own safety or fails to perform a critical step and does not take immediate action to correct the error, the total points for the procedure or specific subpart(s) of the procedure will be deducted by the judge(s).
- 9. Competitors must complete all steps of the procedure listed in the guidelines even if the steps must be simulated/verbalized. (Example: If guidelines call for washing hands but there isn't a sink, then handwashing must be simulated/verbalized.)
- 10. Competitors will be stopped at the end of the time allowed for a selected procedure(s).
- 11. Bonus points will be awarded by the Event Manager for proper attire. A score of 5 or 0 will be added once to the event tally sheet and become part of the composite score.

- 12. The Mastery Level for Category II skill events is considered to be a 70% composite score. NLC competitors will NOT be recognized if they did not achieve a mastery level in their event.
- 13. Competitors must bring all items noted with *** in the materials section of these guidelines to the event.
- 14. Competitors must be familiar with and adhere to the "General Rules and Regulations of the National HOSA Competitive Events Program."
